Dear Harriet Chapel Family and Friends,

February seems like a cold, sometimes lifeless month, but there are two meaningful events that we observe during February. The first is on Feb. 2<sup>nd</sup> when we remember that forty days after Jesus' birth Mary and Joseph brought him to the temple to be presented as their first-born son. Jewish parents were obligated to make a sacrifice of a lamb or, as in Mary and Joseph's case, they sacrificed two turtledoves if they couldn't afford a lamb. The awe-inspiring thing that happened that day was that two devout people who had been waiting for the savior recognized the baby Jesus as the one for whom they had waited. First, upon seeing Jesus, elderly Simeon prayed, "Lord, now let your servant depart in peace, according to your word; for my eyes have seen your salvation which you have prepared in the presence of all peoples, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and for glory to your people Israel". (Luke 2:29–32) Then the prophetess Anna offered prayers of thanksgiving for Jesus and began spreading the word about him.

The second event we observe in February is not a day of celebration. On Feb. 14<sup>th</sup> we will observe Ash Wednesday. Ash Wednesday is the beginning of the 40 days of Lent which commemorates the 40 days Jesus spent fasting in the wilderness before he was tortured and crucified. Ash Wednesday also, is a day that reminds us of our mortality. Typically, people give up something in Lent to stand in solidarity with Jesus and share his suffering. Some people take on acts of goodness and mercy to continue in Jesus' ministry.

It's rare that Valentine's Day and Ash Wednesday fall on the same day. It happened in 2018 and before that it hadn't happened since 1945. It may seem odd that Ash Wednesday, which is solemn and penitential should fall on Valentine's Day when we usually celebrate with candy and roses and Teddy bears. But we often forget that there is sacrifice behind Valentine's Day because tradition has it that originally St. Valentine, who lived in the third century, was killed for performing Christian marriage ceremonies which was against the law in the Roman Empire. Valentine's Day now celebrates love and all things chocolate. For many fasting from chocolate and sweets will be a sacrifice but since Ash Wednesday is such an important day in the church, it may be best to observe Valentine's Day on the evening before when we will serve pancakes and strawberries at our Shrove Tuesday Pancake supper on Feb.13<sup>th</sup> from 4:30-7 p.m.. Pancake suppers actually came about as a way for people to get rid of all the tempting sweets and fats that were forbidden in Lent. Don't worry you'll have a chance to indulge yourself before Lent with pancakes, syrup and sausage and there will be chocolates on the tables and plenty of sweet items on the bake sale table.

On Ash Wednesday we will have a spoken Ash Wednesday Service at noon and a service with Music at 7:00 p.m. Ashes will be imposed at both times. During Lent I'd like to suggest that you take on Lenten disciplines such as fasting, prayer and reading the booklet "Forgiven" by Tim Chester that will be available in the Narthex. During Lent we will have additional services including a Taize Service at 7 p.m. on Monday, March 4<sup>th</sup>.

During February Fr. Doug will host Christian Formation after church and in March we will participate in preparing the church for the Taize service on March 3<sup>rd</sup> and will hold a group discussion of "Forgiven" on March 10<sup>th</sup> after church. We will share Soup and walk the Stations of the Cross on March 18 at 6 p.m. Our intention is not to stay busy but to engage in activities that keep us focused on Christ and his journey to the Cross.

Father Doug will be the Priest in Charge in February and I will be the Priest in Charge in March. If you would like to pray with one of us or confess a sin that weighs heavily on your heart you can use Lent as an opportunity to confess with one of us present. This is called the Rite of Reconciliation of a Penitent, and we can offer you assurance of God's pardon. Just speak with one of us about this anytime during Lent.


We are now in the season of Lent, a period of reflection and prayer. Our weekly scriptures have been paving our way to this day. Since Epiphany we have been hearing readings from Deuteronomy and Jonah explaining and reminding us of laws and punishments which God has passed on to us through the prophets. In St. Paul's letters to the folks in Corinth, we are once again reminded of the consequences of failing to live by God's law and His Son's teaching. There have been a few uncomfortable lessons to read and hear.

But let's not forget the Gospel readings, we are reminded of Christ's love and devotion to us. From John hear of the selection of the first disciples. They are just plain people, laborers, your everyday fishermen. In Mark's Gospel we learn of John the Baptist's arrest and imprisonment. What is Christ's response, "The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near, repent, and believe in the good news." Several more fishermen are selected as disciples and his ministry on earth begins. He heals the infirmed and sick. The bent over folks now are standing tall, the blind gain sight, the lame are walking, the deaf can hear and the blind can see. Crowds follow Jesus and his disciples from town to town. These crowds hare hearing the law of Moses in a new way. They are experiencing the love of God through the words, parables and teachings of Jesus, the Son of God. How are these people rewarded for their belief and faith? Jesus stands on a hillside and gives instruction if praying.

Our introduction to Lent, a time to repent, reflect and to re-examine our prayer life. How often do I talk to God? When do I seek Him out, is it only in times of stress and sorrow? We have been reminded recently that God knows all, sees all and hears all. I find that frightening, but if that is the case, do I still need to pray to Him? You betcha, you have too. We can't take our faith in God or even in his Son for granted. We need to reach out to our heavenly Father and ask or if necessary to beg for His intervention in our lives. Remember, "all things are possible with God".

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
