The liturgical season of Easter is upon us as well as the beautiful spring weather of this time of year. It is a beautiful thing in how they go together. Springtime in this area is beautiful. It is far less so up north where this time of year is often referred to as the "mud season." The snow has melted, and the frost is gone from the ground leaving behind mud, and lots of it. It is so nice to be living here in the springtime.

Our common lives here at Harriet Chapel follow merrily along framed by our worship in this season of Easter. Easter is that time between the celebration of the Resurrection and the celebration of Pentecost. It is 50 days long, 50 days which parallel the Jewish celebrations of Pesach and Shavout (pronounced "shavou"). Pesach, better known as Passover is the celebration of the Exodus of the Israelites from Egypt and Shavout is the celebration of the receiving of The Law, The Torah. The term Torah refers to the first 5 books of the Bible, Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, Deuteronomy. Shavout is also referred to as Pentecost (50 days) which was the celebration being attended by so many people when the Christian experience of Pentecost, a rushing wind, flames as of fire resting on the heads of the disciples, and all the people from many different places speaking in their own languages were somehow able to understand each other. We will celebrate Pentecost on May 19 this year.

It is essential that we worship together, follow the liturgical seasons of the year and the lectionary of appointed biblical readings which accompany those liturgical seasons. It is from them that we learn about Jesus and his life, his message, his saving death and resurrection. However, there is more that we could be doing to increase our knowledge, understanding and experience of our faith in our time. There are many contemporary authors writing on various topics from varying perspectives. Some of these authors are excellent, some far less so and some dangerous. How do we know who is good and who isn't and where can someone begin to learn who is who?

Allow me to suggest an author whom I find to be the best. She is my favorite and she is Barbar Brown Taylor. Barbara Brown Taylor is an Episcopal priest, a retired professor, and of course an author. In 2014 according to Time Magazine she was listed as being amongst the 100 most influential people in the world. Her books are flawlessly written, easy to read, humorous, and incredibly inciteful. I love reading her work.

A book of hers that I would recommend is, "An Altar in the World." The book is about the sacredness of everyday things, everyday encounters, and everyday people. It opens our (or at least my) eyes to see the beauty, the specialness, the grace and love in the most

common encounters, the most common things we do, the most common things that we experience in our lives. It puts a smile on the faces of those who read it.

She has of course written many other books like, "Holy Envy, Finding God in the Faith of Others", and "Always a Guest," (to name 2) written about her travels... "What I value most about speaking about faith far from home is that I have to travel light. I don't know my hosts well. There are so many ways of being Christian that I don't even know for sure how the worship service will go. I certainly don't know who the pillars of the church are, or the troublemakers, or what kind of week that have all had. I don't know what turns a stranger's speech into a sermon for them. I don't know what they depend on it to do. All of these uncertainties unpack my bags until there are only a few things left: a sacred text, a trust in the Spirit, an experience of being human, and the desire to bear good news."....from the Introduction.

Perhaps someday we can form a reading group and read these and other books together.



Fr. Doug opened the meeting at 7 p.m.

+Rector's rpt:

- *Review of Holy Week: positive results on both our part and LWICC. Potential for future joint services.
- *Spaghetti Dinner: Saturday, the 20th. Marcia seems to have everything in control. Pastor Sally volunteered to handle the ice breaker activities.
- *AA celebration: to celebrate their 39th anniversary HERE at Harriet Chapel, they are hosting a potluck on Tuesday, April 23. Pastor Sally is going to make a banner for them, as a token of appreciation for their number of years shared with HC.
- *Pentecost: is May 19th, the second day of the Catoctin Furnace Iron Festival. Since there seemed to be no problem last year, it was decided to hold our usual service at our usual time, 9 a.m. LWICC have decided to make their weekly service a home service. No problem. When we see pain,


Teach us to bring healing,

When we feel confused and afraid,


Remind us to talk to our friends, our family and to you.

The latest report from the Search Committee, by Karen Patterson:

The Rector Search committee met with Canon Kristen Krantz, Canon for Transition, on April 16 to discuss Harriet Chapel's status in searching for a new rector. The meeting was very informative, Canon Krantz shared much with us and was very transparent on all aspects discussed. We felt very hopeful after our discussion and are looking forward to the journey of securing a rector for Harriet Chapel. Our next step at this point is to create an OTM (Office for Transition Ministry) portfolio. This portfolio of Harriet Chapel will be shared with prospective rectors within the Diocese of Maryland as well as outside of our Diocese. The Diocese will be vetting any prospective candidates and then present them to us for follow up and then interviewing. The committee will be meeting on April 25 to put together the portfolio to submit to the Diocese.

Two weeks prior to meeting with Canon Krantz, the search committee met with vestry members from Church of the Transfiguration, Braddock Heights. We had a discussion with them about possibly sharing a rector as they too are in the process of a rector search. Transfiguration is looking to hire a full time rector and is not interested in sharing of a rector at this time. We look forward to working with Transfiguration on church and fellowship projects and jointly broaden our outreach with other Episcopal churches in the area.

As we go through this journey, we will keep you updated. If you have any questions or concerns, please feel free to reach out to any of the committee members; Marcia Bell, Heather Clabaugh, Kathryn Hauser, Denny Hoffman, Joann Miller, Karen Patterson, David Sweeney. Please keep us in your prayers as we do the job to find our new rector that will continue to guide us in God's way.

A LOOK BACK AT HOLY WEEK 2024

As we approach the end of the Easter season, I would like to take another look at this past years' Holy Week. Holy Week has always been my favorite season. I used to believe that the reason was due to my depression, however this year I learned that Holy Week is a favorite for many folks.

The passion of the week, the dramas that are played out for us to help us to cope and understand the WHY's and the what if's. Only a true King, would take on the world for his 'subjects' with the grace and courage that our Lord showed. Did he deny being the Son of God? No. In a moment of weakness, did he plead with his Father to release him from the pain, torture and death which was to come? No. Jesus, when in the Garden of Gethsemane did confirm that 'God's will be done'. What love and devotion to people whom you don't know or have ever met. The love of the Father for all his children would choose to sacrifice one, his Son, Jesus for the rest of mankind.

We see Mary, the mother, knowing in advance that 'a sword would pierce her heart' standing by her son. Offering what comfort, care and love that she can from afar, yet she is not that far from Jesus. Mary always seems to be on the sidelines, waiting along with the other Mary's, Mary of Magdalene and Mary of Bethany. Following Jesus as he carries his cross along trail to the place of his death. They wait, knowing that the time will come when they will be able to wait upon him again. The tears fall silently, the air is heavy, they feel weighed down with grief and sadness. They remain close by, waiting and praying. Other than the Roman soldiers and a few people, who else is with the women to offer them comfort and words of solace?

Peter? He ran away, frightened! Matthew, Andrew, the other disciplines, they are hiding, afraid of what might happen to them if they are found. All are hiding except for John, who is standing by Mary at the foot of the cross and Judas. Poor Judas, I have always felt pity for Judas. Was his betrayal something he had been working on for some time? If so, how long? In the Gospel of John 13: 27, "As soon as Judas took the bread, Satan entered into him." Why Judas, why not Peter or James or Matthew, who used to be a tax collector? Why Judas, was it because he was in charge of their coins, and he was responsible for paying their debts? Only one thing is certain, only the Son and the Father know the truth. Judas, who was in despair and confusion went away and hung himself.

What happened to Pontius Pilot and what about the dream his wife had? Then there is Simeon, wise and concerned for Mary, what happened to him? We can assume that he died peacefully since he had seen the promised messiah. Then there is Joseph of Arimathea and Nicodemus, believers of Jesus and followers, but in SECRET only. They stand ready for what happens next, though they are not really sure what to expect.

The hillside is littered with doubters, mocking our Lord, who is trying to offer what comfort he can to his mother. Such love and devotion, Jesus is hanging onto life by a thread, and he consoles his mother and the disciple whom he loved, John, by pledging his mother to John and John to his mother for future care and comfort.

As they wait, darkness ascends over the world, the heavens rumble and the earth quakes, suddenly the curtain to the most holy of holies is ripped in two! 'It is finished', our King, Messiah, our Lord is dead. Everyone is afraid, uncertain of the future of tomorrow. Yet, a long Roman soldier, a centurion; one who while on duty went to Jesus for the well-being of one of his favorite servants, a Jew, for help and who also had shown kindness to Mary, the mother; the enemy of the Jews a soldier of rank who understood the power of leadership. "The centurion, seeing what had happened, praised god and said, 'Surely this was a righteous man.' (Luke 23:47). "And when the centurion, who stood there in front of Jesus, heard his cry and saw how he died, he said, "Surely this man was the Son of God!" (Mark 15:39) 'When the centurion and those with him who were guarding Jesus saw the earthquake and al that had happened, they were terrified, and exclaimed, 'Surely he was the Son of God!" (Matthew 27: 54).

On the morning following the Sabbath, the women and followers of Jesus found the tomb empty except for the linen shroud. The men believing something nefarious had occurred went running back to the upper room where the others were hiding. The women, however, no longer able to contain their grief, implored the gardener they saw to direct them to the body of their beloved teacher so that the body may be properly prepared for its final resting place. "Then the disciples went back to their home, but Mary stood outside the tomb crying. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb And saw two angels in white, seated where the body had been, one at the head and the other at the foot. They asked her, "Woman, why are you crying?" "They have taken my Lord away" she said, "and I don't know where they have put him". At this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not realize that it was Jesus.

"Woman," he said, "why are you crying? Who is it you are looking for?" Thinking he was the gardener, she said, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have put him, and I will get him." Jesus said to her, "Mary." (John 20: 10-16)

Mary and the others saw the Son of God in all his radiance and glory. The sun was bright, a new dawn had appeared on what began as a cloudy, painful day of an uncertain future. Any doubts were gone, vision blurred by tears were replaced with tears of joy.

During Holy Week, I felt the love of God and his Son like I had never felt it before. Was it due to the joining of two faiths, the Episcopal and Living Water Inclusive Catholic Community? Had my faith journey brought me to this point of my life, that like Mary and the disciplines, I felt loved and worthy? This I can tell you, that like Peter, James and John in the Garden of Gethsemane, I too failed to stay awake. I felt so guilty and unworthy, I imagine that I experienced a very small example of what they felt when the soldiers arrived to arrest Jesus. I had failed at the one thing I was asked to do, that I pledged I would do for him, stay awake and pray. After confessing my failure, I was told that Jesus understood what was truly in my heart. 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
